



# **VMobile for iPad, iPhone, and iPod Touch**

## **User Manual (Version: 1.0.1)**

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## **FOREWORD**

Thank you for choosing QNAP products! This user manual provides detailed instructions of using the product. Please read carefully and start to enjoy the powerful functions of the product!

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## Chapter 1. Overview

VMobile is a mobile video surveillance application provided by QNAP for remote and wireless monitoring of IP cameras and video playback by connecting to VioStor NVR through your iPad, iPhone, or iPod Touch. As long as you have network access, you can connect to and manage your video surveillance system anytime, anywhere.

**Note:** VMobile is applicable to QNAP VioStor NVR running firmware version 3.3.0 or later.

## Chapter 2. Install VMobile

To install the VMobile app, follow the steps below.

1. Download VMobile from App Store.
2. After installation, VMobile will be shown on the screen.



## Chapter 3. Start to Use VMobile

After you have installed VMobile and connected your iPad, iPhone, or iPod Touch to the network, you can use app to connect to VioStor NVR.

### 3.1 Connect to VioStor NVR

Follow the steps below to use VMobile on iPad, iPhone, or iPod Touch. Note that you must enable Internet access on the device first.


1. Open VMobile on the device.



2. Enter the IP address or the domain name of the NVR. Enter the correct port number, login user name, and password.

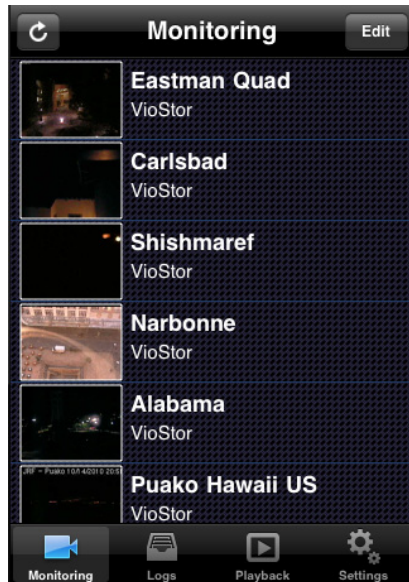
Default user name: <b>admin</b> *
Default password: <b>admin</b>

\* If you are connecting to VS-201/VS-101/NVR-104, the default login name is "administrator" and the password is "admin".









## 3.2 Monitoring

Upon successful login, the monitoring screen will be shown.

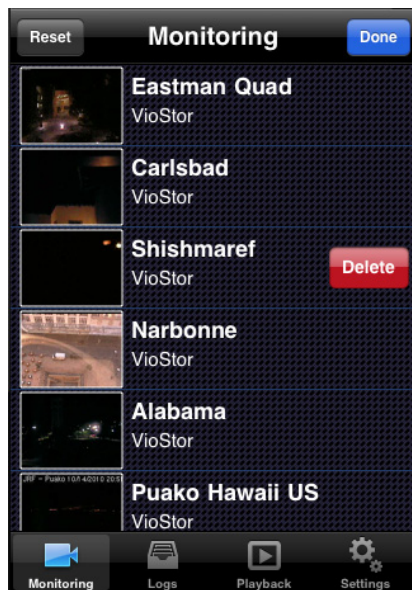




The screen buttons are described below:

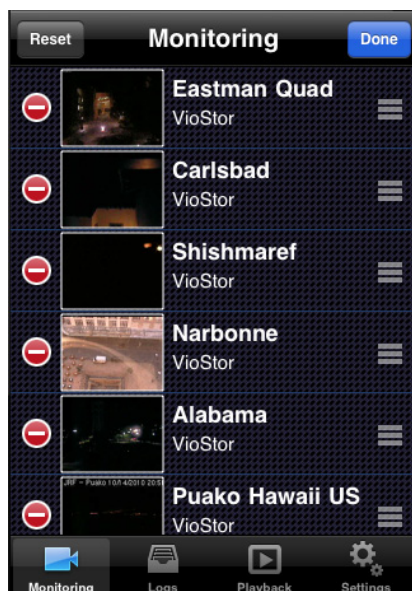
Button	Description
	Refresh the current screen
	Edit the camera channels
	Enter the live monitoring screen
	Enter the logs screen
	Enter the playback screen
	Enter the settings screen



To delete a channel, swipe a channel and press "Delete".

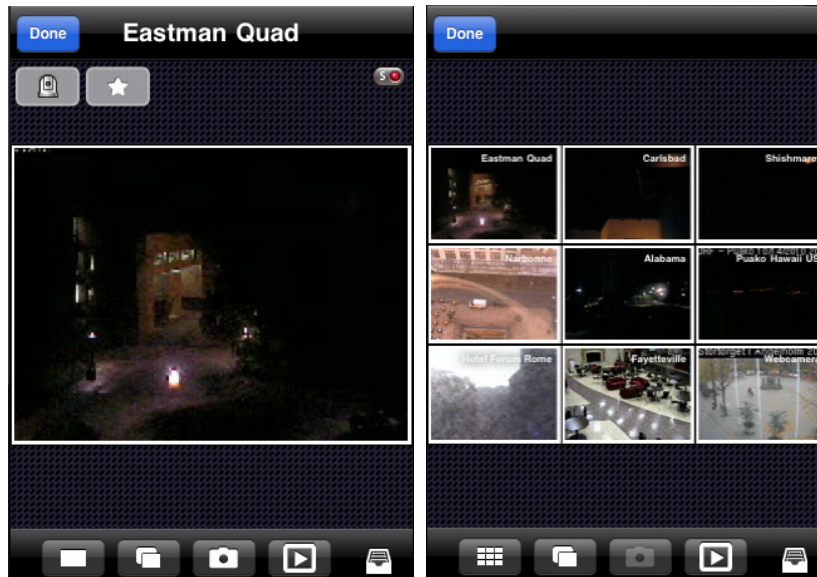


Press the "Edit" button to edit a channel. Press  to delete it or press  to drag or drop the channel to re-order it. Press "Done" to save the settings. To reset monitoring order, press "Reset".








### 3.2.1 Live View


If you have set up VioStor NVR and the network cameras by the web-based management interface or by local display, you can monitor the camera channels streamed from the NVR by VMobile.

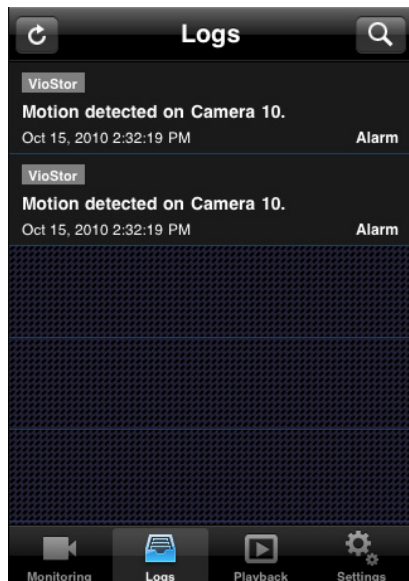


The screen buttons are described below:

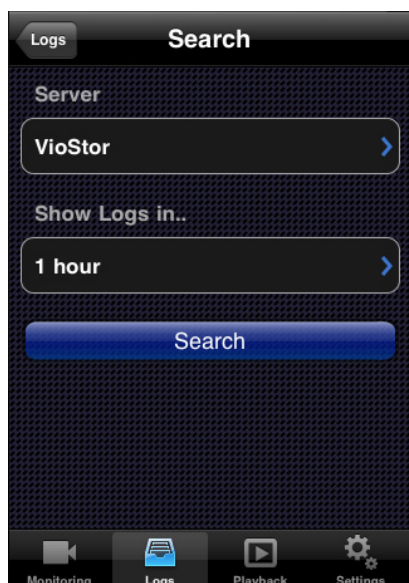
Button	Description
	Switch display mode. Options are 1, 2, 3, 4, 6, 8, and 9 channels.
	Sequential display mode.
	Snapshot. Only available on single-channel display.
	Enter the playback page.
	Enter the event logs page.

### 3.2.2 Event Notification

When alarm recording is enabled and an event occurs, an icon  showing the number of new events in recent one hour (default) will appear. Press the icon to enter the logs screen.



Press an event to play the alarm recording. You can press "Search" to search for the logs by server and time interval.









### 3.2.3 PTZ Control

If your network camera supports pan, tilt, and zoom (PTZ) functions, you can use the PTZ function with single-channel monitoring.

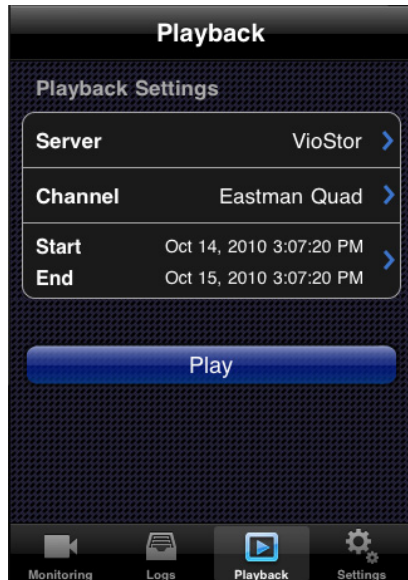


The screen buttons are described below:

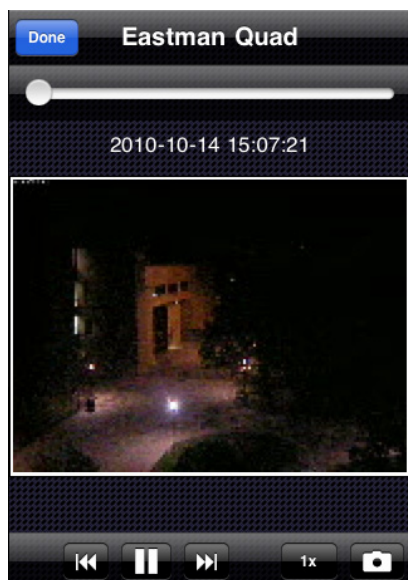
Buttons	Description
	Press this icon to enable or disable PTZ control of the network camera. When PTZ control is enabled, other buttons will appear for you to control the PTZ camera.
Arrow keys	Press the arrow keys on the screen to adjust the viewing angle of the camera.
	Press + to zoom in or - to zoom out.
	Press  to focus near or  to focus far.
	Press this icon and select to move the PTZ camera to a preset viewing point. This function can only be used if you have configured the preset points on the camera.

### 3.3 Playback






You can enter the playback screen to search and play the video recordings of an NVR.



Select the NVR server, channel, start and end time to search for the video recordings on the NVR. Then start to play the matched videos.

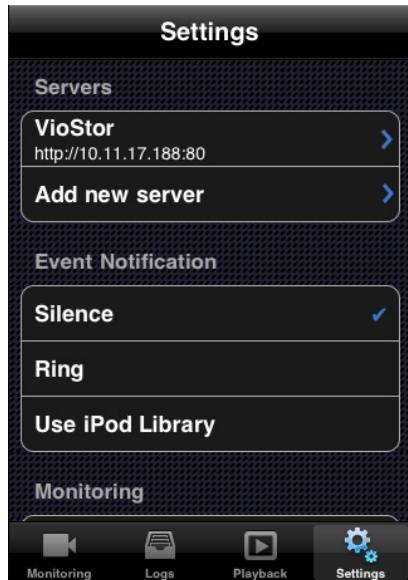


The screen buttons are described below:

Button	Description
	Play the previous video file
	Pause the video
	Play the next file
	Adjust the playback speed
	Take a snapshot

### 3.4 Settings

You can manage and configure the NVR servers, event notification, and monitoring settings on the “Settings” screen.



Press "Add new server" to connect to a VioStor NVR for monitoring and playback.

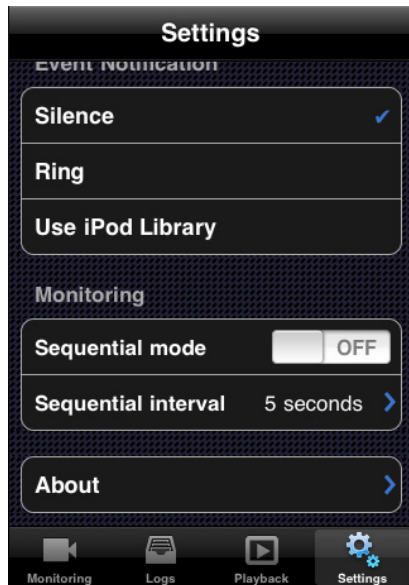

Under "Event Notification", select the alarm type (silence or ring) for the events occur on the NVR. You can also enable/disable sequential display mode and specify the display interval of the network cameras under "Monitoring".
